

Cutting the Cable

"If your cable television bills seem to be getting more expensive it's because they are.

The Federal Communications Commission reported this week that average cable television bills nationwide jumped by 5.8 percent in the one-year period through July, considerably higher than the 3.7 percent increase in the price of all goods and services.

Consumer advocates pounced on the news, saying the report proves that telecommunications deregulation has failed to deliver the promised benefit of lower cable rates.

The cable industry said the single biggest factor behind the higher rates is the increased costs for programming, including sports and entertainment."

The new Pew Research Center data suggest 15% of American adults are now "cord cutters" – that is, they indicate that they once had a cable or satellite TV connection, but no longer subscribe.

Another 9% of Americans have never had a cable or satellite subscription at all, meaning that a total of 24% of Americans currently do not subscribe to cable or satellite TV in their homes (76% of Americans subscribe to pay TV service at home).

Digital Packaged Services

Internet

- You are still going to need this!!
- But this cable can be cut too. Will be addressed in Part 2

Telephone

- Old Telco going away
- VoIP becoming the norm

Television

- Bundled packages to offset costs
- Hundreds of channels available
- Do you need all of them? Some of them? None of them?

Price Plans (Packaged Entertainment)

- Comcast\Xfinity: \$50 → \$170 month
- Dish Network: \$50 → \$80 month (TV only no phone, Internet)
- DirectTV: \$50 → \$125 month (TV only no phone, Internet)
- Cox: \$90 \rightarrow \$160 month
- Verizon FiOS: \$50 → \$270 month

- Streams popular content as well as OTA



"The Times They Are a Changin"

- Service Providers are beginning to unbundle packages
- 3d party content providers are demanding it
- We're not there yet, but slow progress is being made
- Most premium channels now offer individual subscriptions
- New providers, like Sling, are packaging content in smaller bites
- Apple has tried to break up the bundling, but lost...at least for now
- Eventually, we'll be able to subscribe just to the services we want

A Caution...

- Nothing is free
- Primary providers and new services all want to monetize in order to pay for content they resell to you
- Everyone wants to sell you a service
- Netflix = \$9 \$10 a month
- Hulu Plus = \$8 a month \$12 for no commercials
- Amazon Prime = \$8 a month
- Sling = \$20+ a month
- Other content monetizing (A&E, ShowTime, HBO...)
- You can easily be paying over \$50 a month for basic content

SO, where do I do with this info and where do I go from here?

Initial Steps for Cutting the Cable

- 1. Buy your own cable (or xDSL) modem
 - 1. Eliminate monthly lease fees
 - 2. Control your own WiFi network and network addressing
 - 3. DOCSIS3 and speed capable for increased bandwidth
 - 4. Be careful with the brands (read Amazon reviews)
- 2. Review your current cable content packages
 - 1. Do you need all those channels?
 - 2. Reduce premium channels and other unnecessary content
- 3. Establish OTA HD feeds for your TVs and distribute
- 4. Subscribe to Hulu Plus and\or Netflix and other services
- 5. Buy an Apple TV (or Roku or FireTV, or Chrome)

Additional Steps


- Pick a system that will meet your needs and reduce monthly costs
 - Tivo
 - Tablo
 - HD HomeRun
 - Streaming media devices
- Replace leased devices (connected to each TV) with your own
- Find a DVR system that meets your needs
- Settle on an EPG (Electronic Programming Guide)
- And when you're ready tackle Kodi



OTA (Over the Air)

- Local broadcasts over the air
 - Picked up on various forms of local home antennas
 - Line of sight
 - Free
 - Very good quality of HD generally uncompressed
 - Supplements other content providers easily

- HD HomeRun (Silicon Dust silicondust.com) network











HD HomeRun Distribution

- OTA feeds over home network
- Requires Ethernet from device to network or router
- WiFi distribution from there
- Has apps for Apple TV, Amazon FireTV, Roku, Nvidia Shield
- DVR still is the major issue not isolated to HD HomeRun
 - More solutions on the horizon
 - Tivo, Tablo, and others are developing
 - Kodi

 - AppleTV 4th Gen NOT 4k capable






Sticking Points: DVRs
